



## A Chronicle of Philanthropy Study Shows Charitable Giving by ZIP Code

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## A new Chronicle of Philanthropy study

that charts giving patterns in every state, city, and ZIP code shows some surprising <u>results</u>. Check out the cool

\* Wealthier Americans are not the most generous. Those who earn under \$100,000 a year give a <u>interactive tool</u> to see the giving patterns in your neighborhood!

substantially higher proportion of their earnings (7.6%) to charity than those earning more (4.2%).

Some highlights of the findings overall:

- \* Wealthy Americans who live only with other high earners give substantially less
- to charity (2.8%) than those living in economically mixed communities (4.2% is the rate for earners over \$200,000 overall).
- \* Red states give more than blue states but only if religious giving is included.

In secular giving, California leads the pack, with New York second. The Chronicle doesn't specify, but we suspect that arts giving falls under secular giving.

\* Tax incentives make a big difference -

the 13 states that offer incentives to charitable giving show a significant impact.

\*Zip code 10021 on Manhattan's Upper East Side in New York gave the most

in the nation: over \$450 million/year.
