



A Chronicle of Philanthropy Study Shows Charitable Giving by ZIP Code

that charts giving patterns in every state, city, and ZIP code shows some surprising [results](#). Check out the cool [interactive tool](#) to see the giving patterns in your neighborhood!

*** Wealthier Americans are not the most generous.** Those who earn under \$100,000 a year give a substantially higher proportion of their earnings (7.6%) to charity than those earning more (4.2%).

Some highlights of the findings overall:

*** Wealthy Americans who live only with other high earners give substantially less**

to charity (2.8%) than those living in economically mixed communities (4.2% is the rate for earners over \$200,000 overall).

*** Red states give more than blue states - but only if religious giving is included.**

In secular giving, California leads the pack, with New York second. The Chronicle doesn't specify, but we suspect that arts giving falls under secular giving.

*** Tax incentives make a big difference -**

the 13 states that offer incentives to charitable giving show a significant impact.

*** Zip code 10021 on Manhattan's Upper East Side in New York gave the most**
in the nation: over \$450 million/year.
